

## POLS 3250 PUBLIC POLICY: CHALLENGES AND PROSPECTS (FALL 2024)

This course introduces students to the study of public policy, with a focus on Canadian government. Public policy is about how governments decide what to do, or not to do. The course will proceed in two parts. In the first part, we will examine prevalent theoretical and methodological approaches to the study of public policy. In this connection, we will proceed to analyze the Canadian policy subsystem, including actors and institutions that influence policy representation in Canada. The second part of the course will focus on the policy cycle and on how to explain policy change and stability. We will examine some of the central concepts and approaches related to agenda setting, policy formulation, decision-making, policy implementation, and policy evaluation. Where relevant, we will draw upon examples and cases related to public policy in Canada.
